SCRIPTURE READING

I Kings 5:1-12

Now King Hiram of Tyre sent his servants to Solomon, when he heard that they had anointed him king in place of his father; for Hiram had always been a friend to David. Solomon sent word to Hiram, saying, “You know that my father David could not build a house for the name of the Lord his God because of the warfare with which his enemies surrounded him, until the Lord put them under the soles of his feet. But now the Lord my God has given me rest on every side; there is neither adversary nor misfortune. So I intend to build a house for the name of the Lord my God, as the Lord said to my father David, ‘Your son, whom I will set on your throne in your place, shall build the house for my name.’ Therefore command that cedars from the Lebanon be cut for me. My servants will join your servants, and I will give you whatever wages you set for your servants; for you know that there is no one among us who knows how to cut timber like the Sidonians.”

When Hiram heard the words of Solomon, he rejoiced greatly, and said, “Blessed be the Lord today, who has given to David a wise son to be over this great people.” Hiram sent word to Solomon, “I have heard the message that you have sent to me; I will fulfill all your needs in the matter of cedar and cypress timber. My servants shall bring it down to the sea from the Lebanon; I will make it into rafts to go by sea to the place you indicate. I will have them broken up there for you to take away. And you shall meet my needs by providing food for my household.” So Hiram supplied Solomon’s every need for timber of cedar and cypress. Solomon in turn gave Hiram twenty thousand cors of wheat as food for his household, and twenty cors of fine oil. Solomon gave this to Hiram year by year. So the Lord gave Solomon wisdom, as he promised him. There was peace between Hiram and Solomon; and the two of them made a treaty.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING: In 2021, Neighbors in Need "Unfailing Love" offering is focused on supporting organizations and projects that are serving homeless and immigrant communities. One-third of Neighbors in Need funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to provide funding grants to UCC churches and organizations leading justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects in their communities. We'll receive this annual special offering throughout the month of October.

What to Expect at Indoor Worship

Expect to...

1. Wear your mask the whole time you are in the church building.
2. Pick up a bulletin from near the doorways when you come in.
3. Sit only with members of your household or 'pod' (people you regularly interact with outside of church).
3. Respect the social distancing marked in the pews, leaving space between the people around you. This might even mean sitting in a place you're not used to in the sanctuary.
4. Let Kim and Penny do most of the singing. The congregation will sing a song after the sermon and the closing response.
5. Leave your offerings in the offering plates that will be at the front of the sanctuary and also near the bulletins.
6. Go outside after the closing response for fellowship and conversation. Please don't do your mingling inside.
7. Stay home if you have a new cough, fever, or any other new COVID-like symptoms, or if you know you've recently spent time with someone who was COVID-positive.
8. Finally, expect to delight in worshipping our God together in a place that has brought joy and comfort to many people over many years!

We take these precautions out of love and care for each other, most especially for our church children and others who are still particularly vulnerable at this time. We continue to look forward to the time when these precautions won't be necessary. Until then, let us be caring, be patient, and help protect one another.

We are following the guidance of the Illinois Department of Public Health, but also the instruction of our faith which tells us to show love for our neighbor, to protect the vulnerable, and to humbly consider others more important than ourselves.

PIONEER CENTER UPDATES

Through our Wider Missions Ministry, our church regularly supports the Pioneer Center, a private, non-profit charitable organization, providing programs for people with developmental disabilities, behavioral health services and homeless shelter needs to the McHenry County community. Here are some updates about their work.

Unique Day Program Launching in Huntley

Pioneer Center and the Northern Illinois Special Recreation Association (NISRA) are partnering to provide a brand new, recreation based, Intellectual and Developmental Disability (IDD) adult day program to the community. The Bright Program, focused on increasing community independence, will be launching in November and is located at the Deicke Park facility on 11419 S IL Route 47 in Huntley, IL.

“We are excited to introduce this amazing and much needed IDD Day Program to the community,” states Pioneer Center’s Community Day Program Manager Renee Stoklosa. The Bright Program provides personal development through case management, community connections and healthy relationships.

“This collaboration with NISRA allows our clients access to opportunities and activities offered by both organizations at one location,” Stoklosa adds. PADS Homeless Shelter Kitchen Nears Completion

The new PADS Emergency Homeless Shelter in McHenry, IL, fully opened a year ago expanding from a 34 bed shelter to 70 beds and includes bathrooms, showers, a lounge/dining area, laundry, mailboxes and offices. The new commercial kitchen, designed to support food preparation, delivery and storage nears completion. Plans are to be ready to serve meals to clients by Thanksgiving. Future plans include a food service training program that will help the clients develop skills, confidence and secure employment.
